He was assassinated in 1968 while seeking the presidency himself. Robert McNamara	7	1916	2009	Business Executive / Secretary of Defense	Educated at Berkeley and Harvard Business School, Robert S. McNamara was one of the most prominent business and public administrators of his generation. A proponent of management accounting and 'statistical control' he taught at Harvard before working in officer training and campaign planning in the U.S. Army Air Forces during WW2. After the war he began a career as an executive at Ford Motor Company, eventually becoming the first President of Ford from outside the Ford family. He was appointed as Kennedy's Secretary of Defense in 1961, whereupon he attempted to reassert civilian management control over the U.S. military establishment. Derailed by the Vietnam War, he was removed from the Pentagon in 1968 and installed as President of the World Bank, a post he retained until 1981. In retirement he became an outspoken critic of military overstretch and nuclear weapons proliferation. His memoirs <i>In Retrospect</i> (published in 1996) caused considerable controversy; critics accused him of whitewashing history and offering an unwanted and partial apology for the Vietnam failings. Walt Rostow	7	1916	2003	Economist/ Historian/ Political Scientist	Yale and Oxford educated, W.W. Rostow served in the OSS during WW2, followed by an academic post at MIT. In 1960 he published <i>The Stages of Economic Growth: a non-Communist Manifesto</i> , a treatise on economic development that led, in 1961, to his appointment as Deputy National Security adviser. Rostow held various appointments in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, culminating in his period as National Security Advisor between 1966 and 1969 where, famously, he clashed with Robert McNamara. His ultra-hawkish position on Vietnam meant he was not permitted by MIT to resume his academic post on leaving public service in 1969. 					of Fellows aged 22. During WW2 he served in the Office for War Information (a U.S. propaganda agency) and the OSS (the intelligence services precursor to the CIA). Highly active in Democratic politics throughout his life, he co-founded - with Eleanor Roosevelt and Reinhold Neibuhr - the pressure group 'Americans for Democratic Action', and worked as chief speechwriter on both of Adlai Stevenson's presidential campaigns. An academic at Harvard, he was offered various posts in Kennedy's administration, before accepting the new post of 'Special Advisor to the President', effectively making him an 'in-house' historian of Camelot. He administered the Hickory Hill seminars, and went on to write several major books on the Kennedys, including <i>A Thousand Days</i> (2002 / 1965), and <i>Robert Kennedy and his Times</i> (2018 / 1980). He interviewed Jacqueline Kennedy one year after JFK's death (published as <i>Jacqueline Kennedy: Historic Conversations on Life with John F Kennedy</i>), and continued as a speechwriter for the electoral campaigns of RFK, McGovern and Edward Kennedy.		
Sargent Shriver	7	1915	2011	Lawyer/journalist	Yale educated, Sargent Shriver served in the U.S. Navy during WW2, afterwards working as an assistant editor for <i>Newsweek</i> and then as a lawyer. In 1953 Shriver married Eunice Kennedy, sister of the Kennedy brothers. Worked on the Kennedy campaign of 1960 and helped establish the Peace Corps after the election. Served in LBJ's administration in the Office for Economic Opportunity. U.S. Ambassador to France 1968-70. Ran as vice president on the losing McGovern ticket versus Nixon in 1972. Returned to private life, until appointed in 1960 to Kennedy's cabinet as Director of the Bureau of the Budget, partly on JFK's desire for more liberal economists in his cabinet to offset conservatives such as Dillon. His career was wide and varied. He served as White House Press Secretary during the Kennedy presidency, followed by a very short period as a U.S. Senator in 1964. He was involved in Robert Kennedy's presidential campaign in 1968, and was present at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles when RFK was assassinated.
